Net Metering Bill Back for Another Spin

HB 490, sponsored by Reps Wayne and Napier, requires that every retail electric supplier provide net metering to any eligible customergenerator.

Net metering is the concept that any customer can generate electricity for their own use and sell their excess to the Power Company at rates comparable to what the customer pays. Currently, it is allowed that customers can sell power to the Power Company, but the rate the power company pays the customer is not set by law and is usually quite low.

Net metering makes the installation of solar energy systems more economical since the customer no longer has to install a battery system to store excess power for when the sun isn't shining. He simply sells his excess to the power company as he generates it and buys it back when he needs it.

Net metering is not limited to solar energy though; it would be available to other "green" sources of energy. Under the provisions of the bill any electricity generated in excess of electricity used would be tallied and reimbursed to the customer in cash on an annual basis. In the meantime, the excess would be used as a credit against energy used.

This bill also opens the door for independent green power producers to set up operations and be guaranteed a set rate for their power. The rate is set by the legislation and would be adjusted by the Public Service Commission for inflation.

A similar bill was introduced in 2003, was heard in committee, but was not voted on. Several other states have passed similar legislation. This is a bill KCC supports and hopes to get out of committee this session.

Planning Ethics Bill Progresses

Calls from KCC members were helpful in moving HB 388 (sponsored by Jim Wayne and Steve Riggs) forward. The bill was voted out of the House Local Government Committee favorably on Feb. 10. HB 388 requires that the provisions of local ethics ordinances (already mandated by law) be extended to cover local Planning Commissions and Zoning Boards of Adjustment. It further requires that a record of each Planning Commissioner's vote be kept.

HB 388 also requires the Local Planning Commission to get input in the development of a 20 year comprehensive plan from public and private gas, water, sewer, electric, telephone, and wireless telecommunications utilities; public school districts; chambers of commerce; special taxing districts; agricultural organizations; city and county governments; area development districts; and neighborhood, historic preservation, conservation, and homebuilding organizations. The input from these entities is to be documented in the plan.

The bill was amended in committee to delete the requirement for members of local planning commissions to file financial disclosure information. Some committee members thought this would discourage qualified candidates from serving on planning commissions (usually a volunteer position).

Some smaller cities were uncomfortable with the provisions requiring a 20-year component to the plan and the requirement to open the process up to other interested groups. We may see attempts to amend these provisions on the House floor.

This bill is a recommendation from of Governor Patton's Smart Growth Task Force.

Budget Provisions to Watch

KCC would like to see the restoration of funding to the Environmental Quality Commission (EQC) to FY01-02 levels. The EQC is an advisory board that acts as ϵ citizen barometer on the state of Kentucky's environment and compiles essential data used by Department for Environmental Protection. It was removed from last year's budget, but continued under the Natural Resources Cabinet. HB 396 cuts the EQC budget by 1/3 to \$150,000. This will necessitate the elimination of the Commission's only staff position.

Another improvement is to fully fund the Kentucky Nature Preserves Commission (KNPC). To continue current staffing levels an additional \$70,000 is needed in 2005 and \$140,000 in 2006 over the proposed budget. KNPC manages Kentucky's natural areas, inventories remnant natural areas and evaluates potential impacts on protected species and natural habitats for air, land, and water permit applications.

There is some existing language in the proposed budget worthwhile preserving. One is the continuation of the hazardous waste generator fees. These fees support the clean up of state superfund sites. Without reauthorization this fund will cease to exist after April.
